EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS

- One of the important outcomes of collaboration is the prospect of better employability and exposure to industry needs. This has been achieved through internship opportunities and certified skill development courses offered by these reputed organizations. The college in collaboration with Ministry of Human Resource and Development offers courses like 'Supply Chain Management' and 'Tally' for the students
- Several international conferences were conducted in this regard pertaining to the specific problem of bridging the gap between industry and academia. The conference organized by the Department of Bank Management is a case in point. The International Conference was planned in association with the Hindustan Chamber of Commerce, the Confederation of Indian Industry Young Indians, titled "NextGen Innovation Engage, Embrace and Adapt in the Era of Digital Transformation" between 24th and 25th January, 2023. It gave a realistic glimpse into the future that awaits today's generation of students.
- A total of 9 patents have been filed this year as a result of collaboration with various organizations, and out of the nine, five patents have been granted

PRACTICE

 A Centre for research and innovation was established to promote quality research and innovation. Ethiraj Centre for Research and Innovation (ECRIC) was established in the year 2019 with the vision of

- enabling the institution to become a pioneer in research and excellence. The centre is also planning for a lecture series, where eminent people in research and industry would address the faculty and students on the recent trends in research and innovation.
- There is also a plan in the pipeline to launch "The Centre for Excellence for Emerging Technologies" in partnership with RISAYA Academy to offer industry specific expertise to students. The collaboration will train the students in Drone technology and help them expand their career prospects beyond the conventional choices.

EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS

- In 2022-23 ECRIC had funded summer projects of 15 students and Ph.D fellowships were provided for 10 full time research scholars. The Centre sanctioned reimbursement for 30 faculty members. A total of 13 faculty projects have been selected and approved for funding from ECRIC seed money.
- A National Symposium on "Science and Technology for Sustainable Development with Women Empowerment" was organized on 18th Jan. 2023.

PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED AND RESOURCES REQUIRED

- To identify excellent organisations and have tie-ups with them towards the goal of research and innovation in itself is a challenge as involves several hurdles along the way in terms of financial mobilization, additional efforts needed on the part of the teaching faculty and the administration, student involvement etc.
