15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

Our institution strongly believes in providing quality education to students, which lay the foundation for an equitable society. Global mandates on higher education demand that students be exposed to interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary courses as they facilitate a better understanding of society. Keeping this in mind, Ethiraj College's curriculum comprises 26 Interdisciplinary undergraduate courses, 22 Interdisciplinary postgraduate courses and 22 Research programs. All students (both UG and PG) choose at least one allied course offered by other departments in their course of study. It allows for the synthesis of ideas and characteristics from many disciplines. The curriculum is framed in such a manner that students have a holistic grounding in all aspects of life. A diverse set of value aded courses are offered to students to enable them to explore ideas and knowledge outside their chosen field of study. The LMS platform of the college also provides a valuable venue for the faculty from various departments to collaborate and offer an interesting combination of courses for the students.

17.Skill development:

The college has been consistently striving to improve its curriculum to meet the demands of an intelligent society. In line with this commitment, the institution has implemented a SMART (Specific, Measurable, Appropriate, Relevant, and Transferrable) curriculum aimed at producing tangible results and benefiting society. Nearly all of the 1400 courses offered by the departments focus on enhancing skills, increasing employability, and fostering entrepreneurial opportunities. Communication and life skills are mandatory for all students, while value-added courses aim to equip graduates with knowledge and skills essential for the job market. Additionally, the college's capacity-building center, Training Academy, and Ethiraj Centre for Research, Innovation, and Creativity (ECRIC) work to enhance students' competitiveness to meet global standards. The curriculum also places emphasis on Government of India initiatives such as Aathmanirbhar Bharat, Pradhan Mantri Mudra Yojana, Digital India Mission, FIT India Movement, Udaan Scheme, Swachh Bharat, among others. In addition to regular courses, students are encouraged to pursue MOOCs (Massive Open Online Courses) and self-study programs to further enhance their knowledge and skill.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

The institution strongly believes in attaining global standards with Indian Values. As part of the curriculum, students study foundation courses in Tamil, Hindi and Sanskrit. Students can choose from a variety of elective courses offered by the language departments. The students are also encouraged to study Indian culture, its knowledge systems, literature and science. Papers like Indian literature and Mythology expose the students to the great tradition Indian Literature, mythology and the philosophies. "An International Conference on Indian Contribution to Mathematics- Ancient & Modern" was jointly organised by the department of Mathematics and Sanskrit. Indian medicine and food practices are also explored by students in their projects. The department of History offers courses that exclusively deal with Indian History, Culture, Architecture and knowledge systems.

Outcome-Based Education (OBE) is an educational approach centered on the desired graduate attributes or achievements post-

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completion of an academic program. Demonstrating a commitment to nurturing students' overall development, Ethiraj College for Women integrated OBE into its curriculum during the academic year 2019-20 to address the educational requirements of the modern world. All programmes offered by the college adhere to international standards in higher education. The OBE framework emphasizes teaching and learning methodologies that focus on clearly defined learning outcomes, Program Specific Outcomes, and Course Outcomes, with the primary aim of setting rigorous standards for students while also providing opportunities for enrichment and academic support.

With the objective of providing a wholesome education, the college encourages students to enroll in MOOC courses such as NPTEL SWAYAM, Coursera etc. Some courses provide extra credits for completion of such courses online. The college also offers an online course on 'Child Rights and Child Protection' to the public through its LMS platform elearn@ethiraj. CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 - Curriculum Design and Development

1.1.1 - Curricula developed and implemented have relevance to the local, national, regional and global developmental needs which are reflected in Programme Outcomes (POs), Programme Specific Outcomes (PSOs) and Course Outcomes (COs) of the various Programmes offered by the Institution.

The curriculum followed by Ethiraj College for Women has been designed to cater to the unique needs of the 21st century. It focuses on a SMART (Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Relevant, and Transferable) curriculum that can effectively address local, regional, national, and global requirements. From 2008-2009, the college has been following a Choice Based Credit System (CBCS) for all Undergraduate and Postgraduate programmes. CBCS

facilitates flexibility in the choice of courses and promotes horizontal mobility across the departments. In 2019, the college adopted an Outcome Based Education (OBE) to equip the students with 21st-century skills: critical thinking, problem solving, analytical reasoning, cognitive skills, and self directed learning.

Adopting OBE led to a significant shift that entailed the restructuring of curriculum, pedagogy, and assessment practices. The Programme Educational Objectives, Programme Outcomes, Program Specific Outcomes, and Course Outcomes are defined and based on the revised Bloom's Taxonomy. Based on the changing trends in the industry, the college introduced B.Com. Accounting & Finance in the year 2016-2017 and M.Sc.Applied Psychology and M.A. Human Resource Management in the year 2020-2021. The college periodically reviews and updates the curriculum based on the latest guidelines laid by the University of Madras, UGC, TANSCHE, and the AICTE. A structured feedback is received from all stakeholders every year to ensure quality academic outcomes. MOOCs and Self-study papers with extra credits are integrated into the curriculum.

Environment and Sustainability

At the institutional level, a common course in Environmental Studies provides a holistic understanding of environmental issues and the urgency for eco-friendly living. It instills a sense of appreciation and responsibility toward preserving and conserving nature and its resources. Courses such as Literature and Environment, Environmental Economics, Environmental Biotechnology, Environmental Microbiology and Environmental Journalism in the curriculum help the students understand complex environmental issues and realise the importance and need for becoming environmentally conscious. Research Supervisors are given an allowance of Rs.3000/- per research student on successful completion of viva-voce. Seed Money is provided for faculty to encourage research publications and patents and the college also funds Major and Minor Research Projects. Awards are given to the faculty members who make significant contributiontowards research in a discipline. Employees who have completed 15 and 25 years of service are honoured during annual college day programme. Children of the employees are given preference at the time of admission. Daycare facilities are provided for the benefit of staff members with infants. Non-teaching staff are provided with noon-meal on all working days of the year. They are provided with two sets of uniforms, festive gifts, and educational loans for their wards. And 10% waiver is given on tuition fees for the wards of nonteaching staff .

A dedicated medical centre is available for students and employees on campus. A separate medical fund is reserved for supporting staff and health cardsare provided for the same.

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Colour-coded waste bins are strategically positioned across the campus for the segregation of biodegradable and nonbiodegradable waste. The college has partnered with Day & Day, a professional housekeeping company, to maintain cleanliness throughout the campus. Regular cleaning of restrooms is conducted to ensure a hygienic environment for both staff and students. In student restrooms, sanitary napkin vending machines and disposal incinerators are installed for the proper disposal of sanitary pads. The local corporation collects non-recyclable solid waste on a scheduled basis. Furthermore, the college operates an on-campus vermicomposting unit as part of its environmentally friendly initiatives, converting leaf litter into compost used as organic fertilizer to maintain the greenery in campus. Wastewater is managed through an underground sewage system connected to the municipal drainage channels. The science departments try to minimize chemical usage in labs by conducting microscale experiments whenever feasible. . Single-use plastic is strictly prohibited on campus, and steel utensils are exclusively used in canteens and mess halls to reduce plastic and paper waste. Non-biodegradable waste is collected and delivered to recycling agents. E-waste, including broken or unusable hardware, is disposed of through designated e-waste vendors on a regular basis. Hazardous chemicals are used sparingly.
